We do need to continue to monitor the structured teaching that is delivered on the GI firm with slightly lower satisfaction scores than the other firms (but it is OK)... good feedback from the vascular firm and the urology firm</p> <p>Update May 2018: A quality assurance visit to the Surgery Department at BSUH took place on 23 January. The visit included a meeting with a student representative, a tour of facilities and a meeting with the teaching lead and two other key members of the teaching team. Feedback/ findings included that the students felt the student handbook was confusing, the teaching team did not have a method of helping students to access informal learning opportunities, many of the surgery consultants had not attended the BSMS teaching support course and that card access to certain areas (eg. changing areas) was not working for students. These items would be followed up via student feedback and reviewed in due course.</p> <p>GMC response: Many thanks for this comprehensive update. The original concern related to too many students attending the surgical wards. Has this issue now been resolved? With regard to the other issues that came out of the Jan 2018 visit, do you consider that these items need to be monitored via the MSAR or are you content that these issues can be monitored through your own QM processes?
